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COVID-19, CRIME AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE: MAPPING CRIMINOLOGICAL RESEARCH PROJECTS AROUND THE WORLD

Abstract

Since 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic and government measures to limit its spread have had a huge impact on society. Crime opportunities and criminal justice systems have also been affected by this health crisis. With the aim of international collaboration, a working group within the European Society of Criminology has been created to promote research among European researchers and thereby facilitate the exchange of information and comparative studies on the impact of COVID-19 on crime and criminal justice systems. Thus, the School of Criminal Justice of the University of Lausanne has undertaken a mapping of the ongoing projects related to COVID-19. The aim of this research is to identify, using different keywords, all current projects carried out in English, French, German, Spanish or Portuguese. To be selected, the project had to (1) focus on the impact of COVID-19 on different areas of criminology, (2) be carried out in one of the five languages mentioned, and (3) be conducted by a legitimate research organization. Our results highlight the research question, the time periods and geographical areas covered, and the methodologies used. In total, the keywords chosen were able to report on 68 projects in progress in various fields of criminology, such as prisons, policing, domestic violence, or cybercrime.

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Introduction

The COVID-19 pandemic and the restrictions imposed by governments to combat its expansion have caused significant changes in opportunities related to crime (Ashby, 2020; Buil-Gil et al., 2021; Gosangi et al., 2020; Hawdon et al., 2020; Hodgkinson & Andresen, 2020; Leslie & Wilson, 2020; Payne, 2020). A little over a year after the start of anti-COVID measures, recent studies in criminology have been able to provide a first overview of its effects on crime. Still, a lot of the criminological fields yet to be explored and many study projects are under way around the world. To answer all these questions, a working group has been created by the European Society of Criminology¹ to promote research among European researchers and thereby facilitate the exchange of information and comparative studies on the impact of COVID-19 on crime and criminal justice systems (ESC, 2021).

While waiting to be able to include as many projects as possible in this working group, the first step is to get a general idea of the various studies already in place around the world. Thus, the aim of this present work is to provide researchers with a reliable and fast way to find these different projects using search engines, then to expose these projects.

Method

We identified four main keywords and listed their main synonyms and related terms to be sure to find as many searches as possible. For example, the keywords and Boolean operators we used for the searches in English were as follow: daterange: 2458881-2459457 (covid-19 OR coronavirus OR SARS-CoV-2) research project criminology AND (study OR inquiry OR survey).


These combinations were modified step by step according to the proposed results, adding or removing the synonyms described above one by one to observe the effects on the results (Andrieu, 2018; Éduscol, 2015; Vidmar, 2018). Despite our attempts to include a diverse range of search engines, only the Google search engine have been used in this search as it is able to efficiently handle the various Boolean operators allowing us to refine our search.


To be sure to include the bulk of ongoing criminological projects, we have considered the time period from February 1st, 2020 to August 30th, 2021. The languages considered in this project were English, French, Portuguese, Spanish and German.



Result

As of August 30, 2021, our keywords were able to report 68 searches. This dashboard presents a map with the number of ongoing projects worldwide about the impact of COVID-19 on different areas of criminology (for precise figures look at the histogram per country), the criminological subject investigated, the data collection method envisaged and the project language.





Discussion

The most studied criminological area appears to be policing, that is, law enforcement by police. Due to the new standards introduced by lockdowns, strict hand hygiene measures, the wearing of masks or even social distancing, it seems obvious that this field of study should be at the forefront of criminological studies, with the social reaction that goes with it. In addition, unlike other areas which could only retrospectively observe the events that occurred during the different waves of the pandemic, this theme remains very topical with the introduction of increasingly more and more strict vaccination standards around the world. This theme differs from the "Police" category in that it is concerned with newly created norms or laws and how these are applied and felt by the population, rather than the internal organization of the police or the actual experience of the officers.

Domestic violence appears to be the second most studied area, with almost a third of studies using it as a theme. As preliminary studies had shown, forced proximity to an abusive partner during lockdown has increased reported cases of domestic violence, and many aspects remain to be investigated in this area.

Regarding the nature of the data collected, in the projects that specified it, 20 studies provide for the use of a survey, and 20 will lead to interviews, sometimes at the same time. It seems that these two means are privileged compared to police data, which will only be used in 7 research projects. This difference may be due to the fact that official statistics are not immediately available and, for reasons of time or even authorizations, researchers have turned their attention to other indicators. Another explanation could be that official statistics tend to underestimate the real number of offenses committed or suffered, especially in cases of domestic violence which is a particularly studied area.

Limits

First, whether or not you come across an updated list of current research projects in an institution depends greatly on the transparency of that institution or the country in question.

Second, the readability of different websites can also become a barrier: indeed, it can quickly become difficult to navigate between the different pages to find this list of projects - if such a list really exists. As a result, it is quite possible that some projects have escaped our notice because of their location on the website in question.

Third, there are of course ongoing projects carried out in languages that are not understood by the research team, thus preventing us from including them here.

Finally, despite all the precautions taken so that Google's indiscreet algorithm does not influence the results displayed, we cannot guarantee with absolute certainty that another person inserting these same keywords will find the exact same results presented here.

Conclusion

In order to facilitate international exchanges between researchers studying different fields of criminology impacted by COVID-19, it seemed important to highlight reliable Boolean keywords and operators thanks to which it would be possible to quickly find a list of these different projects.

Our results were able to report on nearly seventy research projects in progress, all dealing with the impact of the pandemic on various aspects of criminology, including a certain number of studies which, by the proximity of their theme, could be enriched if collaborations could be set up between research teams. The cooperation between these different researchers, proposed by the Working group of the European Society of Criminology, will greatly enrich the field in question and thus, in the long term, improve our understanding of the profound changes linked to crime that have taken place. In addition, as COVID-19 is still relevant today, this study may be repeated in several months, or even years, in order to update research carried out on this theme.
